NJASA Curriculum and Instruction Committee Meeting Notes – November 19, 2009

- 1. Committee members were welcomed. Dr. Timothy Peters, NJDOE Office of Assessment and Mr. Stanley Karp, Education Law Center, Secondary Reform Project were introduced.
- 2. Dr. Peters highlighted information regarding Alternate High School Assessment (formerly known as the SRA) including:
 - a. Since NCLB the testing population as grown.
 - b. Assessment is more efficiently accomplished with a lower cost even with the increase in population.
 - c. Formative assessments are a work in progress as well as activities related to performance assessment. Because of budgetary implications the formative assessments and the ASK in the native language (Spanish) are vulnerable.
 - d. To save "SRA" NJDOE worked to improve perceptions regarding validation and credibility.
 - e. HSPA will be phased out and replaced with end of year tests. This is now "open to evolution" depending upon the new administration. NJDOE is currently following policy and plans until directed to do otherwise.
 - f. 2011 Algebra I
 - i. All districts will pilot this year.
 - g. AHSA (formerly SRA) will be impacted by the end of course model.
 - h. New process will begin in December
 - NJ Teachers will be trained to score in regional centers
 - ii. Two windows for PATS
 - iii. A summer window will be added (in July).

- 3. Mr. Stan Karp provided information about high school exit exams and the SRA
 - a. Of the 50 states 26 have exit exams, 24 do not. (NY, NJ & MA have exit exams).
 - b. Of the 26 states that have exit exams 19 have alternatives (e.g. substituting an SAT scores, grade point average, etc.) Two have an SRA like process (NJ and Maryland).
 - c. In NJ there are currently 100,000 individuals 18-24 year olds who are not working and have not graduated from high school.
 - d. Algebra I becomes a graduation requirement in 2014.
 - e. The "diploma penalty" will be linked to end of course exams.
 - f. Biology exam in 3rd year of pilot testing; is a requirement for the Class of 2012.
 - g. ELC activities related to SRA.
 - i. ELC is looking for SRA data "anonymously" from NJ high schools. Anyone who may have information that is useful should contact Mr. Karp.
 - ii. A3692/S2574 are bills that would require examination of the "phase 1" impact (Algebra 1 and Biology) as tests are implemented.

NJ's Assessment System is Changing

- Proficiency Levels Raised for 5th-8th Grades
- o NCLB Benchmarks Increasing (2011)
- o End of Course Exams Coming
- o AHSA Replaces SRA
- o New federal & state initiatives

HS Exit Exams (HSEE)

- o 26 states have HSEE
- o 24 states do not
- o Of the 26 w/HSEE, 19 have alternatives
- o Some substitute other test scores/GPAs
- o Some allow for graduation portfolios
- o A few involve alternative diplomas
- Two (NJ/Md.) had locally scored alternatives

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HSEE Issues

- Where to set cut score/proficiency levels?
- o Impact on achievement levels?
- High stakes for diploma or % of course grades?
- o Impact on post-school outcomes/grad rates/dropout rates?
- o Research mixed, but cause for concern

NJ Background

- o High HS graduation rates
- o Relatively high NAEP scores
- Relatively high college participation & completion rates

SRA as a 'backdoor diploma'

- o Less 'rigorous' than HSPA
- Too many chances to pass (3 HSPA, unlimited SRA)
- Too many administrative/procedural loopholes
 - Using same PATs for both instruction & test
 - Uncertain reliability of local scoring
 - Overuse beyond original intentions

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SRA misconceptions/fallacies

- o SRA was a 'local' standard/test
- o No one failed SRA
- Only students who passed HSPA should be counted in NJ graduation rates
- HSPA was a more reliable indicator than SRA of future success & college preparation
- o SRA 'diplomas' were worthless

- o Audit system rejected
- o Measurement, Inc. hired

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SRA Data

- o About 12% of NJ graduates use SRA
- o 1 of 3 urban graduates use SRA
- 105 Schools Have Over 10% SRA Grads
- SRA is Statewide Issue (58% non-Abbott)
- o Most (68%) Use SRA for Math
- Total SRA Students Dropped By 5000 from 2005-09

Suggested Revisions to Initial Guidelines

- o Add a summer administration window
- Open second administration window to all students
- o Return January results earlier
- Make provision for native language populations
- Allow some district flexibility in dates for administrative windows

Suggested District Steps

- Maintain SRA Instructional programs for students re-tested in October
- Alert students/families about new limits on SRA option
- Contact NJDOE/State Board re suggested revisions to guidelines.
- Document impact of new AHSA
 (ex. change in # students using AHSA, impact on grad/dropout rates, outcomes for individual students &

groups)

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Larger SRA/AHSA Issues

- o What explains 33% decline in SRA use?
- How do post-school outcomes compare for HSPA/SRA/Dropouts?
- What are impact/costs of restricting alternative pathways to graduation?
- Will there be disparate impact on some groups of students/communities?
- How will move to EOC exams affect availability of alternative pathways?

Pending NJ Assessment Plans

- o Pilot tests in Spring 2010
 - o Biology
 - o Algebra I
 - o Algebra II
- Require Biology & Algebra I for graduation w/class of 2012 (11/Jrs.)
- o Set cut scores/proficiency levels
- o Still framed as HSPA

NJ Algebra I Exam

- 28,500 Students took Spring 09 exam(27% of all Algebra I students)
- 19% met Achieve levels for proficient or advanced proficient
- o 26% basic 55% below basic
- All current Algebra I students must take 2010 exam
- o Cut score must be set
- o Required for graduation beginning 2011 (juniors)

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Biology Exam

- o Third year of pilot testing Spring 2010
- o Scale scores & proficiency levels to be set
- o Performance Section Scoring Moved to MI
- Will be a graduation requirement for class of 2012 (Juniors take in 2011)
- o No ASHA/alternative in place

Future of Alternatives?

- 'As the department phases in competency assessments to replace the various components of the HSPA, there will be an alternative way for students to demonstrate competency.'

Future of Alternatives?

o 'Officials in New Jersey recommended that states proactively connect with and consult relevant stakeholders in the early stage of developing alternate pathways to graduation so their approach can be scrutinized through multiple perspectives, preventing unnecessary complications for implementation.'

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'NJ Secondary Education Redesign Review Act'

- o A3692/S2574
- Provides 'opportunity to learn guarantee' to students re new graduation tests
- Requires evaluation report on 'Phase I' impact (Algebra I/Bio) additional graduation requirements/tests are implemented

Opportunity to learn provision

 'No student [shall] be required to pass a competency assessment to receive a Stateendorsed high school diploma until the Department of Education has demonstrated that all students have access to the qualified teaching personnel and academic support necessary to prepare the students for such assessments.'

Phase I Evaluation

- Requires NJDOE report to legislature, including:
 - Changes in course enrollments (Bio/Alg I/Eng.)
 - Changes in co
 - Staff/facilities impact (including prof. dev.)
 - Identification of successful interventions/supports/personalization strategies
 - Report on impact/costs/challenges
 - Projections of costs/concerns for Phase II & III
- Phase II & III shall not be implemented unless Phase I report 'demonstrates that school districts have the capacity to implement the requirements.'

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NJ Secondary Education Redesign Review Act

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Possible Action Steps

- o Support HS Redesign Review Act A3692/S2574
- Document impact of HS graduation/SRA reforms on dropout/grad rates at school, district & state levels.
- Monitor development of new assessments including policies/stakes for new exams. Press for high quality performance alternatives
- Advocate for the reforms & resources needed to improve outcomes for all students.

The SRA Context

- In recent years, 11,000-15,700 students have achieved their diploma via the SRA, most of them general education students;
- 68% of SRA profiles completed are in mathematics, 32% in LAL.
- In some schools a majority of seniors graduate via the SRA;
- Most students who go through the SRA process "pass" the SRA;

The SRA Context, cont.

- The SRA has been long criticized as a "back door" to a high school diploma; 0
- 2005 the State Board adopted a resolution calling for the elimination of the SRA;
- March 2008 the State Board adopted the department's proposal to improve the SRA by reforming the SRA administration process; 0
- This means tightening up of the administrative and scoring procedures; 0
- Retaining the SRA in its current form is not an option, 0

High schools with SRA usage rates of 10% or more in 2008 were information about their SRA required to submit detailed student population:

- 105 schools met or exceeded the 10% threshold;
- This requirement will be repeated this year (based on the class of 2009 cohort).




SRA Data - District SRA 2008 Surveys

- Almost 20% of schools reported that some classes were taught by teachers who were not certified in the subject area;
- Students who fail the NJ ASK8 are likely to fail the HSPA (see graphs on following slides); 0
- Most schools had programs in place to use NJ ASK8 scores to identify at-risk students; 12 schools had no such programs in place. 0

The New SRA

- We are here today to talk about what the SRA will look like in 2009-2010 and beyond;
- We can identify the fundamental principles that will apply;
- We will provide some of the details about how this process will work;
- Other details will be provided in the coming weeks.

The New SRA: Core Principles

 The new SRA is not about "getting prepared for success in their poststudents through" - it's about assuring that all students are secondary lives; The SRA "problem" is not a testing issue but a learning and teaching issue, and math learning issue especially.

The New SRA: Administrative Principles

- The SRA will continue to be administered locally - however:
- Students will not take SRA PATs until after the October HSPA scores are in (i.e., early January);
- Students will not have unlimited opportunities to complete PATs;
- windows, one in January, the other in April. There will be two PAT administration

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The New SRA: Administrative Principles

- centers organized by the NJ testing vendor, The scoring will be conducted at regional staffed with NJ teachers recruited and trained by the vendor;
- The SRA vendor will report results following each administration window, in time to inform graduation decisions.

The New SRA Process - Key Details (tentative dates – to be confirmed)

- First PAT administration window: January 6-28, 2010; 0
- Second window: April 12-30, 2010;
- At the start of each administrative window, districts will download a set of PATS from the state vendor's web site: 6 LAL PATs (3 reading, 3 writing) and 8 Math PATs (2 per cluster); 0
- district will select and administer 4 LAL PATs and/or 5 Math PATs From among these PATs, during first administration window to each SRA student; 0
- Students must successfully complete 3 LAL PATs (including one writing PAT) and 4 math PATs (1 per cluster) to meet SRA requirements. 0

The New SRA Process – Key Details

- Vendor will supply scannable student PAT answer documents and pre-ID labels in advance; 0
- Districts will ship student responses to state vendor, using prepaid labels provided; 0
- Vendor will distribute student responses to scoring centers and develop online score reports; 0
- as needed, from a second selection of PATs only students who did not "pass" the January SRA administration will participate in During second window, districts will administer additional PATs, the second window; 0
- District staff will certify security of administration process and proper return of secure SRA materials. 0

The New SRA Process

SCORING

- Vendor will recruit, hire, and train scorers from among New Jersey teachers; 0
- DOE will expect districts to release teachers for this purpose and encourage their participation; 0
- districts; teachers working weekends will receive Substitute stipends (\$120 per day) will be paid stipends directly, if local policy allows; 0
- Teachers will not be scoring their own students. 0

SRA Timeline 2009-2010 (Draft a/o 8/26/09))

- September 2009; SRA Instructional Program
- October 6-15, 2009: HSPA retest administration
- December 18, 2009: Districts receive October 2009 HSPA scores
- December 18-January 4, 2009: Districts receive SRA answer documents and pre-ID labels from state vendor;
- January 4-6, 2010: Districts download SRA PATs;
- January 6-28, 2010: First Administration Window
- January 29-February 3, 2010: Vendor receives SRA student responses from districts;
- February 15-March 31, 2010: Vendor scores student responses and reports results to districts via online rosters;
- March 2-11, 2010: HSPA administration
- March 29-April 1, 2010: Districts access SRA PATs for second administration window;
- April 12-30, 2009: Second Administration Window;
- May 1-3: Vendor receives student responses from districts;
- May 10-June 2, 2010: Vendor scores student responses and reports results online.

ELL (LEP) SRA Issues

- Spanish language PATS available for the Department expects to be able to make two SRA administration windows;
- languages but can make no assurances at We shall review options for additional this time;
- students should presume that PATs will be in English and probably in Spanish; SRA instructional support for these
- Further policy details about this issue will be forthcoming.

Reminder: Summer 2009 SRA

- Deadline for Summer 2009 SRA submission (Appendices H, J, Y, Z) to counties is August 31, 2009;
- reviewed by DOE for eventual submission Student responses to SRA PATs "banked" for the graduating class of 2010 will be to the state vendor to be linked to the student's subsequent SRA data file;
- Students beginning 2009-2010 school year with "banked" SRA work must sit for October 2009 HSPA.
